

What's Happening in the Maps Training Program

The students will begin their orientation at Maps Counseling Services in mid-August 2025. Maps is a 9-12month practicum and internship placement site that supports students in working across the lifespan. We also train Candidates for Licensure who have their masters or doctoral degree and wish to work towards their licensure while at Maps.

Annie Dintino-Cucchi is a doctoral student from the Clinical Psychology Program at Rivier University. Annie has a background as an early childhood special educator as well as a clinical research assistant to the Center for Trauma-Responsive Practice Change. She states that her interest is in “perinatal therapy and providing therapeutic support for young children and families experiencing trauma.” Annie will be supervised by Dr. Gina Pasquale.

Allyson Lavoie is a doctoral student from the Clinical Psychology Program at Antioch of New England. Allyson comes with experience in trauma-informed care, relational therapy, and creative interventions. She states that her “experience as a youth theater director has enriched my ability to connect with clients creatively and empathetically, fostering resilience and emotional expression.” Allyson will be supervised by Dr. Gina Pasquale.

Randyn Markelon is a master's level student from the Clinical Mental Health Counseling Program at Antioch of New England. Randyn brings experience through her work with regional nonprofits. She states that through her non-profit work “I've gained a deep understanding of our communities unique needs and resources”. Randyn will be supervised by Dr. Megan Smith.

Meet **Thomas Hulslander, PsyD, MA**, a license-eligible clinical psychologist who joined Maps Counseling Services in July.
